Federal COVID-19 Response Legislation

On 5/15/20, the U.S House of Representatives passed the Health and Economic Recovery Omnibus Emergency Solutions (HEROES) Act (H.R. 6800). The HEROES Act is a \$3 trillion coronavirus relief package (over 10 years) that, among other things, contains funding for programs supporting older adults. The HEROES Act: provides:

- \$20 million for the Older Americans Act (OAA) Title III-C Nutrition Services and Native American Nutrition Services:
- \$20 million for the OAA Title III-B Supportive Services;
- \$20 million for the OAA Title III-E Family Caregiver Support;
- \$10 million for the OAA Title III-D Health Promotion/Disease Prevention Programs;

increases:

- The federal Medicaid matching rate for every state by an additional 7.8% (which when added to the ٠ 6.2% increase provided under the Families First legislation would increase the match rate by 14%);
- The federal share of Medicaid home- and community-based services (HCBS) by 10%;
- SNAP (Wisconsin FoodShare) benefits by 15% and raises the minimum benefit for seniors from \$16 to \$30 through Sept. 2021 (and blocks the implementation of regulatory changes that would limit access to benefits);

provides:

- \$1.5 billion for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP);
- \$1.2 billion for Section 202 Housing for the Elderly; and
- \$9.6 billion for the Social Services Block Grant (SSBG).

The HEROES Act also includes expanded unemployment assistance, assistance for state and local governments, an additional \$1,200 economic relief payment to individuals, hazard pay for front-line workers, housing assistance to help pay rent/mortgages, and health insurance premium payments for workers who are laid off.

The Senate is not expected to take up the House bill (which passed mostly along party lines) until into June and changes to the bill are anticipated. Stay tuned for upcoming alerts to contact U.S. Senators Tammy Baldwin and Ron Johnson and share with them why these programs and services are critical to the health and well-being of older adults in your community.

Need to Know

OAA Title III-D Technical Assistance Q & A

Question: Can Aging Units use Title III-D dollars to purchase technology needed to implement high-level evidence-based health promotion programming?

Answer: Yes, under the authority of the Major Disaster Declaration, the State Unit on Aging will allow the use of Title III-D dollars to purchase technology if it is a cost to implement high-level evidence-based health promotion programming. However, there is a line item for assistive technology under Title III-B. Agencies are allowed to move Title III-B funds to Title III-D as well.

We urge counties to develop policies and procedures governing the provision and usage of devices and to consider issues such as:

- 1. Will the devices be provided on loan or permanently?
- 2. What are the criteria for distribution?

3. What type of assessment will be made to determine the conditions for provision and the frequency of reassessment?

- 4. Can individuals in the home younger than age 60 use the device?
- 5. Will IT support be provided and by whom?
- 6. How will software updates be provided?
- 7. Who is responsible if the device is broken, lost or stolen?
- 8. Will it be used only for the duration of the public health emergency and then retrieved?

We encourage OAA programs to coordinate with existing programs such as ACL's Assistive Technology Programs prior to use of OAA funds to purchase devices through the following link:
