Reminder: Wisconsin State Plan on Aging draft for (FFY) 2026 –2028 ready for public review

The new Wisconsin State Plan on Aging for federal fiscal years (FFY) 2026–2028 has been drafted and is now ready for public review.

Every three years, the Wisconsin State Unit on Aging develops a state

plan and submits it to the federal Administration on Aging. The state plan is required for the state to receive federal funding under the Older Americans Act of 1965, as amended. Additionally, the state plan helps to structure our priorities, set an agenda for aging services and programs, and explain the financial plan and formulas that allocate program funding.

The Wisconsin State Unit on Aging has taken a forward-looking approach to the challenges of a rapidly aging population. This state plan prioritizes adapting and improving aging programs, funding, and network culture to effectively serve growing and demographically complex older population. Given growth and change in the older population, this state plan reviews and updates the state's method for targeting program resources to those with the greatest need. Additionally, the plan highlights ongoing work to bring the Wisconsin State Unit on Aging's policies and procedures into closer alignment with new clarifications detailed in the Older Americans Act final rule, Code of Federal Regulations 45(1321).

Need to Know

Medicaid markup pushed to week of May 12th

Late last week, the House Energy and Commerce committee (with responsibility for Medicaid) and the Agriculture committee (responsible for the federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program or SNAP [FoodShare program in Wis.]) announced they would not hold a markup on May 7th (to show what Medicaid cut ideas they are proposing) as initially planned. Disagreement about how deep and what cuts to make to Medicaid and SNAP are cited as the main reason for delay. This is good news, as it gives us one more week to connect with U.S. Senators Ron Johnson and Tammy Baldwin and your U.S. Representative about the importance of Medicaid and SNAP to the people you serve and what impact cuts to Medicaid will have on older adults and people with disabilities, low income families, family caregivers, Medicaid provider agencies and workers, and your community. Last week, the Wisconsin Department of Health Services (DHS) released a model that calculated the impact of three different potential ways Congress is considering cutting Medicaid —per capita caps, increasing paperwork to prove work status, and reducing the amount of federal Medicaid administrative match. Congress could also propose different Medicaid cut ideas that are not in DHS's model that would also impact Wisconsin Medicaid programs.

The Energy & Commerce and Agriculture Committees are now planning to hold their markups the week of May 12th. If the House completes their final markups next week, it could still be in position to do a full House vote the week of the 19th.

President's Budget Calls for Major Eliminations

The Trump Administration released several budget documents late last week as part of the President's "skinny" budget for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026. A skinny budget is typically used in a President's first year, as they need more time to develop a budget that reflects their priorities but want to begin signaling to Congress what these priorities are by releasing high-level documents.

The full budget is not expected to be released until later this month, leaving us to assume that the proposed cuts to and reorganization of Older Americans Act (OAA) and other aging programs referred to in this Wisconsin Aging Advocacy Network (WAAN) <u>Action Alert</u> are still in place.

The President is proposing a **22.7 percent overall cut to non-defense discretionary (NDD) funding** in FY 2026, while raising defense spending by 13 percent. NDD funding includes OAA, State Health Insurance Assistance Programs (SHIPs), Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) and a host of other government efforts that support older adults, people with disabilities and caregivers outside of the mandatory funding programs, such as Medicare, Medicaid, and Social Security.

While details by program are not yet available, the cover letter on the President's skinny budget claims that the NDD cuts "still protect [...] funding for homeland security, *veterans, seniors,* law enforcement, and infrastructure." (Emphasis added.) At this time, all we have is the leaked U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) budget which eliminated OAA Title III D, OAA Title VII LTC Ombudsman program, SHIPs and several other key programs formerly under ACL (including State Developmental Disability Councils, Disability Protection and Advocacy agencies, and the Lifespan Respite Care program)—so the accuracy of this statement can't yet be challenged. The skinny budget does not speak to any of those proposed cuts, nor does it refer to any programs currently administered by ACL. The skinny budget does contain details on the following agencies or programs, however, so here's what IS in the budget.

What We Know About the President's FY 2026 Budget

- The **Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program** (LIHEAP) is slated for elimination in the budget, with the Trump Administration claiming it is rife with fraud and abuse.
- The **Community Services Block Grant** (CSBG) has also been slated for elimination in the Trump budget, claiming "these grants [to Community Action Agencies] are laden with equity-building and green energy initiatives."
- The **Community Development Block Grant** (CDBG) is also proposed for elimination in the budget, asserting that "CDBG is poorly targeted, and the program has been used for a variety of projects that the Federal Government should not be funding."
- Section 202 Housing for the Elderly has been merged into a block grant with other targeted housing programs. The budget states: "The Budget empowers States by transforming the current Federal dysfunctional rental assistance programs into a State-based formula grant which would allow States to *-continued-*

- design their own rental assistance programs based on their unique needs and preferences. The Budget would also newly institute a two-year cap on rental assistance for able bodied adults, and would ensure a majority of rental assistance funding through States would go to the elderly and disabled."
- The **Corporation for National and Community Service**, which operates the AmeriCorps Seniors programs (this includes the **RSVP**, **Foster Grandparent Program** [FGP], **and Senior Companion Program** [SCP]), is slated for elimination in the President's budget.
- OAA Title V Senior Community Services Employment Program is slated for elimination, with the Administration claiming, "seniors would be better served by programs operated by State and local governments, with proven track records of increasing wages."
- The budget on the **Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP)**: "To further improve the health of seniors consistent with the President's Make America Healthy Aging (MAHA) initiative, the Budget ends CSFP and replaces it with MAHA food boxes. The MAHA food boxes remove administrative middlemen to provide higher-quality food directly to seniors. Unlike the current approach using food banks, which provide those in need with shelf-stable foods that are high in sodium and other harmful ingredients, MAHA boxes would be filled with commodities sourced from domestic farmers and given directly to American households. This approach of boxing commodities was highly successful at the end of the first Trump administration as a COVID pandemic response."

Next Steps

It is important to remember that the President's budget is just a blueprint, not an actual appropriations bill. Congress must agree to implement these funding levels (including zeroing out programs) through their appropriations process, which is just getting started.

Our national partners will keep us updated as the full details of the President's budget become available. While we wait for the final budget to be released, advocates need to continue to take action to protect the integrity of OAA programs and services. Proposals to cut \$230 billion from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) are advancing, with significant changes that could deeply impact food security for vulnerable communities. Among the most concerning is the proposal to expand time limits, meaning individuals who cannot meet work hour requirements would only be eligible for SNAP benefits for three months in a three-year period. This would disproportionately affect individuals with disabilities, caregivers, and those in unstable or low-wage jobs who struggle to consistently meet these rigid requirements.
